WEDNESDAY

Leaving All to Flee From Jesus

Read Mark 14:43–52. What happens here that is so crucial to the plan of salvation?

>>> Jesus had made His decision to die for us and now He must face the reality. The devil made as difficult as — he convinced one of His own betray Him...

Mark 14:42 42 Rise, let us be going. See, My betrayer is at hand."

>>> Jesus did not say run for your lives...
Judas

John 13:26-30 26 Jesus answered, "It is he to whom I shall give a piece of bread when I have dipped *it*." And having dipped the bread, He gave *it* to Judas Iscariot, *the son* of Simon.

- **27** Now after the piece of bread, Satan entered him. Then Jesus said to him, "What you do, do quickly."
- **28** But no one at the table knew for what reason He said this to him.
- **29** For some thought, because Judas had the money box, that Jesus had said to him, "Buy *those things* we need for the feast," or that he should give something to the poor.
- **30** Having received the piece of bread, he then went out immediately. And it was night.

Mark 14:43–52 43 And immediately, while He was still speaking, Judas, one of the twelve, with a great multitude with swords and clubs, came from the chief priests and the scribes and the elders.

- 48 Then Jesus answered and said to them, "Have you come out, as against a robber, with swords and clubs to take Me?
- 49 I was daily with you in the temple teaching, and you did not seize Me. But the Scriptures must be fulfilled."
- 50 Then they all forsook Him and fled.

READ

It is shocking that one of Jesus' closest associates betrayed Him to His enemies. The Gospels do not go into great detail about Judas's motivation. But Ellen G. White writes: "Judas had naturally a strong love for money; but he had not always been corrupt enough to do such a deed as this. He had fostered the evil spirit of avarice until it had become the ruling motive of his life. The love of mammon overbalanced his love for Christ. Through becoming the slave of one vice he gave himself to Satan, to be driven to any lengths in sin."—Ellen G. White, *The Desire of Ages*, p. 716.

- Psa 41:9 Yea, mine own familiar friend, in whom I trusted, which did eat of my bread, hath lifted up his heel against me.
- Jhn 12:20 And there were certain Greeks among them that came up to worship at the feast:
- Jhn 12:21 The same came therefore to Philip, which was of Bethsaida of Galilee, and desired him, saying, Sir, we would see Jesus.
- Mat 2:1 Now when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judaea in the days of Herod the king, behold, there came wise men from the east to Jerusalem,
- Mat 2:2 Saying, Where is he that is born King of the Jews? for we have seen his star in the east, and are come to worship him.

Young man flees naked

Mark 14:49 49 I was daily with you in the temple teaching, and you did not seize Me. But the Scriptures must be fulfilled."

****READ****

The disciples all flee, including Peter, who nevertheless will reappear, following Jesus at a distance and ending up getting himself in trouble. But Mark 14:51, 52 tells of a young man following Jesus, an account found here and nowhere else in the canonical Gospels. Some think it was Mark himself, but that is unprovable. What is remarkable is that he runs away naked. The young man, instead of leaving all to "follow" Jesus, leaves all to "flee" from Jesus.

<u>Jhn 18:7</u> Then asked he them again, <u>Whom seek ye?</u> And they said, Jesus of Nazareth.

<u>Jhn 18:8</u> Jesus answered, I have told you that I am *he*: if therefore ye seek me, let these go their way:

Jhn 18:9 That the saying might be fulfilled, which he spake, Of them which thou gavest me have I lost none.

Betrayal in itself is deplored by all, even by those who make use of betrayers (compare with Matt. 27:3–7). But Judas's deed is particularly nefarious because he seeks to hide his betrayal under the guise of friendship. He gives the crowd instruction that the man he kisses is the man to arrest. It appears that Judas wanted to hide his perfidy from Jesus and the other disciples.

Chaos breaks out when the crowd arrests Jesus. Someone draws a sword (John 18:10, 11 says it was Peter) and cuts off the ear of the high priest's servant. Jesus addresses the mob, chastising them for doing in secret what they were afraid to do in the open, when He was teaching in the temple. But **Jesus ends with a reference to the Scriptures being fulfilled**. It is another signal of that dual plot running through the Passion Narrative—that the will of God is coming to fulfillment even as the will of man works to destroy the Messiah.

Think about the fearful idea that being a slave of only *one vice* led Judas to do what he did. What should this tell us about hating sin and, by God's grace, overcoming it?



Additional Notes

<u>Luk 22:3</u> Then entered Satan into Judas surnamed Iscariot, being of the number of the twelve.

<u>Luk 22:4</u> And he went his way, and communed with the chief priests and captains, how he might betray him unto them.

<u>Luk 22:5</u> And they were glad, and covenanted to give him money.

<u>Luk 22:6</u> And he promised, and sought opportunity to betray him unto them in the absence of the multitude.

51. A certain young man. This apparently trivial incident does not appear to have any particular connection with the events of the night, yet Inspiration must have had some reason for including it in the narrative. It has been suggested that the author of the Gospel, John Mark (see Acts 12:12), here refers cryptically to his own connection with the arrest of Jesus. This "young man" can hardly have been one of the disciples, for they had all already forsaken Him and fled (Mark 14:50). It should be pointed out, however, that any suggestion regarding the identity of the young man is no more than a conjecture, reasonable though it may appear. Compare John's studied failure to identify himself by name (John 21:20–24).

The young men. Textual evidence favors (cf. p. 146) the simple reading "they."

52 Naked. Perhaps completely so, or more likely, clad only in his undergarment, or tunic (see on Matt. 5:40; John 21:7).
