## Daniel Perrin – Lesson 2: Signs of Divinity – Tuesday, October 8: The Healing of the Blind Man: Part 1

- 1. John 9:1-16 Consider the human element of this story
  - a. The weight of judgment THEY felt from that moment on as he grew up
    - The disciples expressed what EVERYONE thought
- 2. The Lesson asks: <u>What did the disciples think was the cause of this man's blindness, and how did Jesus</u> <u>correct their false beliefs?</u>
  - a. John 9:1-2 Now as Jesus passed by, He saw a man who was blind from birth. <sup>2</sup> And His disciples asked Him, saying, "Rabbi, WHO SINNED, <u>this man</u> or <u>his parents</u>, that he was born blind?"
  - b. Option 1 Inherited Consequence –
  - c. Option 2 is a <u>BIZARRE</u> WORLDVIEW PRENATAL SIN
  - d. Satan inserts destructive thinking EVERYWHERE HE CAN to <u>ruin</u> everything he can— even in God's church.
- 3. Jesus' response: **VS. 3** Jesus answered, "Neither this man nor his parents sinned, but that the works of God should be revealed in him. We can struggle and suffer <u>BY NO FAULT OF OUR OWN</u>
  - True: we CAN cause ourselves injury and painful consequences
    - AND we SHOULD PRAYERFULLY <u>search out the cause</u> of any problem
  - a. But not every trouble is directly traceable to our own actions.
    - We don't need to feel judged by God BECAUSE we are suffering
      - AND we <u>shouldn't judge others</u> too quickly because of what they are going through.
      - EVEN IF someone's physical suffering is caused by their own decisions, we are to be compassionate
  - b. Jesus COMPLETELY BYPASSES the blame question
    - V. 4-5 I must work the works of Him who sent Me while it is day; the night is coming when no one can work. <sup>5</sup> As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world."
    - Focuses on the WORKS OF GOD to be revealed
    - By doing so, He instructs US to spend more time looking at the CHARACTER OF GOD
      And LESS TIME trying to figure out who's wrong? / who's to blame?
    - Jesus then DEMONSTRATES that He didn't come to debate the cause of this man's suffering. What did He come to do?
  - c. After all Jesus tells us His mission in Luke 4:18 (quoting Isaiah 61): "The Spirit of the LORD is upon Me, Because He has anointed Me to preach the gospel to the poor; He has sent Me to <u>heal the</u> <u>brokenhearted</u>, To proclaim liberty to the captives and <u>recovery of sight to the blind</u>, To set at liberty those who are oppressed;
    - No talk of BLAME here, but a plan of action to RESTORE the suffering
    - FOR US, Jesus extends the same mission in Isaiah 58:6-10 to relieve the suffering
- 4. What did Jesus DO?
  - a. Vs. 6-7 When He had said these things, He spat on the ground and made clay with the saliva [How curious would YOU have been as you watched?]; and He anointed the eyes of the blind man with the clay. <sup>7</sup> And He said to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (which is translated, Sent). So he went and washed, and <u>came back seeing.</u>
  - b. Born with a non-functional visual system
    - Somewhere during prenatal development, the optic function stopped developing.
    - SO, no visual stimulus was received No typical INPUT into the visual cortex of the Occipital lobe

- Without that input, the <u>neural pathways</u> that would have been formed in the brain for receiving and interpreting visual stimuli would never have formed
- As a result, the <u>brain compensates</u>, assigning different functions to use the capacity of that part of the brain.
- There were <u>certain functions of brain activity in sighted people that just NEVER EXISTED</u> in this man
  Jesus created neural pathways that DIDN'T EXIST Not like repairing a broken arm
- He uses CLAY to make a New Creation EX NIHILO (out of nothing)
- 5. FROM Romans 4:17-22 God <u>gives life to the dead and calls those things which do not exist as though they</u> <u>did</u>; <sup>18</sup> who, <u>contrary to hope, in hope believed [IN OTHER WORDS / when all hope was gone / when there</u> was no hope / beyond hope / past hope / hopeless], so that he became the father of many nations, according to what was spoken, "So shall your descendants be." <sup>19</sup> And not being weak in faith, he <u>did not</u> <u>consider his own body, already dead</u> (since he was about a hundred years old), and the <u>deadness of Sarah's</u> womb. <sup>20</sup> He <u>did not waver at the promise of God</u> through unbelief, but was strengthened in faith, giving glory to God, <sup>21</sup> and <u>being fully convinced that what He had promised He was also able to perform.</u> <sup>22</sup> And therefore "<u>it was accounted to him for righteousness.</u>"
- 6. ENCOURAGEMENT for those of you who are suffering with NO HOPE
  - a. God's Word is filled with promises that God makes good to the suffering

**John 16:33** – These things I have spoken to you, that in Me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world.

**Psalm 34:17-19** – The righteous cry out, and the LORD hears, and delivers them out of all their troubles. <sup>18</sup> The LORD is near to those who have a broken heart, and saves such as have a contrite spirit. <sup>19</sup> Many are the afflictions of the righteous, but the LORD delivers him out of them all.

**Revelation 21:4** – And God will wipe away every tear from their eyes; there shall be no more death, nor sorrow, nor crying. There shall be no more pain, for the former things have passed away."

**Psalm 119:71 –** It is good for me that I have been afflicted, that I may learn Your statutes.
