The Healing of the Blind Man: Part 2

Read John 9:17–34. What questions did the leaders ask, and how did the blind man respond?

John 9:17–34 17 They said to the blind man again, "What do you say about Him because He opened your eyes?" He said, "He is a prophet."

18 But the Jews did not believe concerning him, that he had been blind and received his sight, until they called the parents of him who had received his sight.

- **19** And they asked them, saying, "Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How then does he now see?"
- >> we see obvious evidence here that the Pharisees could not deny this man could see. He is no longer blind. To settle it in their mind once and for all they asked his parents.
- **John 9:20** His parents answered them and said, "We know that this is our son, and that he was born blind;
- 21 but by what means he now sees we do not know, or who opened his eyes we do not know. He is of age; ask him. He will speak for himself."
- 22 His parents said these *things* because they feared the Jews, for the Jews had agreed already that if anyone confessed *that* He was Christ, he would be put out of the synagogue.
- 23 Therefore his parents said, "He is of age; ask him."
- >> so what do we see going on here? Why did the leading Jews take such a position against Jesus Christ? Why aren't they happy to know that Jesus was the Christ, that is the Messiah? It is because by this time they have made a decision that he did not fit their ideas about the Messiah. They thought He should be delivering us from the Romans, they misunderstood His mission.

During the time when Jesus was on earth, the Jews, including the scribes and Pharisees, had specific expectations for what the Messiah would do. These expectations were shaped by the Hebrew Scriptures (the Old Testament) and various Jewish traditions. The key expectations included:

- 1. **Political and Military Leader** Isaiah 9:6-7; Jeremiah 23:5-6: The Messiah was expected to be a descendant of King David who would rise as a powerful political and military leader. This leader would liberate the Jewish people from Roman occupation and oppression, restoring the sovereignty of Israel.
- 2. **Restoration of the Kingdom of Israel** Amos 9:11; Ezekiel 37:24-25: The Messiah would restore the Kingdom of Israel to its former glory, as it was under King David and King Solomon. This included re-establishing a Jewish monarchy and rebuilding the national institutions.

- 3. **Rebuilding the Temple**: The Messiah was expected to rebuild the Holy Temple in Jerusalem, which had been destroyed by the Babylonians and later rebuilt, but was in need of restoration and purification.
- 4. **Gathering the Exiles**: The Messiah would gather all Jewish exiles from around the world and bring them back to the Land of Israel, fulfilling the prophecy of the ingathering of the exiles.
- 5. **Establishing a Reign of Peace and Justice**: The Messiah's rule was expected to be characterized by peace, justice, and adherence to the Torah. He would establish a righteous government, end injustice, and bring about a time of global peace and prosperity.
- 6. **Spiritual Renewal**: The Messiah would lead a spiritual revival among the Jewish people, bringing them closer to God and encouraging greater observance of the Torah and its commandments.
- >>> These hopes were deeply rooted in the socio-political context of the time, as the Jewish people were living under Roman occupation and were yearning for national and religious redemption.
- >>To get a little more background as to what is happening in John chapter 9, let's take a quick look at some things that had happened before:
- >> John chapter 5 Jesus heals a man that was lame and unable to walk for 38 years that was waiting by the pool of Bethesda for the moving of the water. Jesus healed this man on the Sabbath day and told him to take up his bed and walk.
- Jhn 5:18 Therefore the Jews sought the more to kill him, because he not only had broken the sabbath, but said also that God was his Father, making himself equal with God.
- Jhn 7:1 After these things Jesus walked in Galilee: for he would not walk in Jewry, because the Jews sought to kill him.
- >>> It was beginning to spread in society the leaders of the Jews wanted to kill Jesus
- Jhn 7:25 Then said some of them of Jerusalem, Is not this he, whom they seek to kill?

Jhn 7:26 But, lo, he speaketh boldly, and they say nothing unto him. Do the rulers know indeed that this is the very Christ?

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Jhn 7:37 In the last day, that great day of the feast, Jesus stood and cried, saying, If any man thirst, let him come unto me, and drink.

Jhn 7:38 He that believeth on me, as the scripture hath said, out of his belly shall flow rivers of living water.

Jhn 7:40 Many of the people therefore, when they heard this saying, said, Of a truth this is the Prophet.

Jhn 7:41 Others said, This is the Christ. But some said, Shall Christ come out of Galilee?

Jhn 7:42 Hath not the scripture said, That Christ cometh of the seed of David, and out of the town of Bethlehem, where David was?

Jhn 7:43 So there was a division among the people because of him.

Jhn 7:44 And some of them would have taken him; but no man laid hands on him.

Never man spake like this man

Jhn 7:45 Then came the officers to the chief priests and Pharisees; and they said unto them, Why have ye not brought him?

Jhn 7:46 The officers answered, Never man spake like this man.

Jhn 7:47 Then answered them the Pharisees, Are ye also deceived?

Jhn 7:48 Have any of the rulers or of the Pharisees believed on him?

Before Abraham was, I am.

Jhn 8:56 Your father Abraham rejoiced to see my day: and he saw it, and was glad.

Jhn 8:57 Then said the Jews unto him, Thou art not yet fifty years old, and hast thou seen Abraham?

Jhn 8:58 Jesus said unto them, Verily, Verily, I say unto you, Before Abraham was, I am.

Jhn 8:59 Then took they up stones to cast at him: but Jesus hid himself, and went out of the temple, going through the midst of them, and so passed by.

The Formely blind man begins to witness

John 9:24 So they again called the man who was blind, and said to him, "Give God the glory! We know that this Man is a sinner."

- **25** He answered and said, "Whether He is a sinner *or not* I do not know. One thing I know: that though I was blind, now I see."
- **26** Then they said to him again, "What did He do to you? How did He open your eyes?"
- **27** He answered them, "I told you already, and you did not listen. Why do you want to hear *it* again? **Do you also want to become His disciples?**"
- **28** Then they reviled him and said, "You are His disciple, but we are Moses' disciples.
- **29** We know that God spoke to Moses; *as for* this *fellow*, we do not know where He is from."

John 9:30 The man answered and said to them, "Why, this is a marvelous thing, that you do not know where He is from; yet He has opened my eyes!

- 31 Now we know that God does not hear sinners; but if anyone is a worshiper of God and does His will, He hears him.
- **32** Since the world began it has been unheard of that anyone opened the eyes of one who was born blind.
- 33 If this Man were not from God, He could do nothing."
- 34 They answered and said to him, "You were completely born in sins, and are you teaching us?" And they cast him out.

This long section of John 9 is the only portion of John where Jesus is not the main actor on the stage, though He is certainly the subject of discussion. Just as the question of sin started the story (John 9:2), the Pharisees think Jesus is a sinner because He healed on the Sabbath (John 9:16, 24), and they will slander the healed man as "born in utter sin" (John 9:34, ESV).

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A curious reversal occurs. The blind man comes to see more and more, not just physically but spiritually, as he is growing in his appreciation for Jesus and for belief in Him. The Pharisees, in contrast, become more and more blind in their understanding, first being divided over Jesus (John 9:16), and then not knowing where He came from (John 9:29).

Meanwhile, his recounting of this miracle gives John the opportunity to tell us who Jesus is. The theme of signs in John 9 intersects with several other themes in the Gospel. John reaffirms that Jesus is the Light of the world (John 9:5; compare with John 8:12). The story also deals with Jesus' mysterious origin. Who is He, where is He from, what is His mission? (John 9:12, 29; compare with John 1:14). The figure of Moses, who is referenced in previous miracle accounts, also appears in this chapter

(John 9:28, 29; compare with John 5:45, 46 and John 6:32). Finally, there is the theme of the response of the crowd. Some love darkness rather than light, while others respond in faith (John 9:16–18, 35–41; compare with John 1:9–16, John 3:16–21, John 6:60–71).

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So scary here is the spiritual blindness of the religious leaders. A once-blind beggar can declare, "'Since the world began it has been unheard of that anyone opened the eyes of one who was born blind. If this Man were not from God, He could do nothing" (John 9:32, 33, NKJV). And yet the religious leaders, the spiritual guides of the nation, the ones who should have been the first to recognize Jesus and accept Him as the Messiah—they, despite all the powerful evidence, cannot see it. Or instead, they don't really want to see it. What a powerful warning about how our hearts can deceive us!

Read 1 Corinthians 1:26–29. How does what Paul writes there fit what happened in this scene, and how does the same principle apply even now?

God has chosen the foolish things

- **1 Corinthians 1:26–29 26** For you see your calling, brethren, that not many wise according to the flesh, not many mighty, not many noble, *are called*.
- **27** But God has chosen the foolish things of the world to put to shame the wise, and God has chosen the weak things of the world to put to shame the things which are mighty;
- 28 and the base things of the world and the things which are despised God has chosen, and the things which are not, to bring to nothing the things that are, that no flesh should glory in His presence.
