Daniel Perrin – L11: Ruth and Esther – Tuesday, June 10: Boaz, as Redeemer

- 1. Did Boaz know that by fulfilling his family obligations, his story would be told over 3,000 years later?
 - a. That his marriage would be an example of God's love for the world?
 - b. Normal life becomes the theater for demonstrating Christ
- 2. In the book of Ruth, Naomi comes to represent the hopeless situation of Israel destitute of children
 - a. Listen to the description of **Ruth 1:5** Then both Mahlon and Chilion also died; so the woman survived her two sons and her husband.
 - **Ruth 1:11** But Naomi said, "Turn back, my daughters; why will you go with me? Are there still sons in my womb, that they may be your husbands?
 - Bitter cry Ruth 1:20 I went out full, and the Lord has brought me home again empty.
 - b. There is no heir to support her as she is alone
 - Even more: no continuing of the family name
 - No one left to preserve the family heritage on the land and declare what God has done through *THIS* family
 - Naomi's situation is OUR situation
 - We're coming to a spiritual dead-end
- 3. Ruth 2:20 introduces a concept that is developed through the Bible
 - a. Ruth has been gleaning in Boaz's field and reports that to Naomi
 - b. 2:20 Then Naomi said to her daughter-in-law, "Blessed be he of the LORD, who has not forsaken <u>His</u> <u>kindness</u> to the living and the dead!" And Naomi said to her, "This man is a relation of ours, one of our close relatives."
 - c. Go'el Kinsman / Near Relative
 - The Go'el ACTS OUT the part of the Near Kinsman (close family member)
 - The word is based on the word "to redeem"
 - d. In the Law of Moses, a close relative had responsibilities AND rights due to their relationship
 - For example: Buy back what his poor brother had sold to pay a debt and couldn't get it back (Leviticus 25:25-26)
 - Receive restitution that was owed to his kinsman (Numbers 5:8)
 - Avenge the wrongful death of his kinsman unless the safety of the City of Refuge prevented him from doing so (Numbers 35)
 - The go-el fought for justice for his family
 - **Proverbs 23:11** For their Redeemer is mighty; He will plead their cause against you.
 - e. One main purpose: preserve the heritage of a family their LAND (given by God) and their FAMILY line
 - In human families, there was Not just ONE, but a pool of Near Kinsmen
- 4. Notice that a tragic crisis raises the need for the Kinsman Redeemer to step into action
 - a. This is why that term Go'el is a reference to God's work
 - Sin is a tragic crisis for us, isn't it?
 - So we need a Kinsman Redeemer Go'el
 - In Genesis 48:16, Jacob says God has REDEEMED him from evil
 - Job 19:25 calls God his Go'el Redeemer who will return to restore what he had lost
 - In **Psalm 19:14**, David calls God, "my Strength and my Redeemer (Go'el)"
 - Isaiah uses Go'el in reference to God 13 times (41:14, 43:14, 44:6, 47:4, 48:17, 49:26, 60:16, 54:5, 54:8, 63:16)
 - b. When the word is translated into Greek, it is replaced with three words meaning "ransom"
 - These Greek words especially applies to Christ

- Matthew 20:28 just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many." (also Titus 2:14, Rom. 7:24, Gal. 1:4, Col. 1:13, 1 Thes. 1:10)
- Jesus is our Near Kinsman having become ONE OF us.
 - **Hebrews 2:11** ... for which reason He is not ashamed to call them brethren...
- 5. Picking up the story in **Ruth 3:8–9** Now it happened at midnight that the man was startled, and turned himself; and there, a woman was lying at his feet. ⁹ And he said, "Who are you?" So she answered, "I am Ruth, your maidservant. Take your maidservant under your wing, for you are a close relative."
 - a. Ruth proposes marriage so that Boaz will fulfill the duties of Near Kinsman to preserve the Family Line
 This means marrying her
 - b. Boaz is willing but he is familiar with the family and introduces a surprise
 - Ruth 3:12 Now it is true that I am a close relative; however, there is a relative closer than I.
 - This reminds us that sin has been welcomed as a closer relative, but its first-claim must be removed.
- 6. Boaz promises to carry out his part in **3:13** He tells her to wait and he will deal with the closer relative
 - a. Naomi praises him for following through in **3:18** Then she said, "Sit still, my daughter, until you know how the matter will turn out; for <u>the man will not rest</u> until he has concluded the matter this day."
 - b. In chapter 4:1-12 Boaz legally acquires the redemption rights for himself.
 - c. This is a representation of Jesus who takes care of our PRIOR CLAIM Publicly
 - He will not rest until He has concluded the matter
 - He pays the price of redemption
 - Taking us FULLY AS HIS / taking all our debts / welcoming us into His family with His name
 - Sharing his full inheritance with us (that was the issue with the other Kinsman, he didn't want to share the inheritance that's the selfishness that we don't find in Jesus)
 - And He legally frees us from the claim of sin
- 7. The redemption brought about by Boaz guarantees the continuation of Elimalech's family
 - a. This was NOT possible in human power alone there had to be a Kinsman Redeemer
 - b. AND provides support for Naomi in her old Age
 - c. In **4:13** "...the Lord gave her conception, and she bore a son."
 - And in **4:14** All praise and honor goes to God for the Go'el and for the blessing He brings about through Ruth a son who will support her in her old age
 - God's hand of guidance was behind everything in the book of Ruth
 - To bring about THIS marriage, which ultimately led to the REDEEMER OF THE WORLD
 - d. When the Go'el was introduced in 2:20, it was connected with God's HESED His loving-kindness
- 8. The book of Ruth reminds us that Marriage is an illustration
 - a. Jeremiah 3:14 "Return, O backsliding children," says the LORD; "for I am married to you."
 - b. A Christian Marriage is a LIVING visual aid to the world
 - A Christian husband and wife who submit their will to God ... their marriage will look different, with different outcomes.
