"God's Original Plan" — Exodus 23 Study Outline

I. Setting the Scene

1. Israel fresh from Egypt

○ Centuries steeped in pagan culture → needs re-education in God's ways.

2. Types of biblical law

| Category | Scope & duration | Examples in Exodus 23 | |
|----------------------|---------------------------------------|--|--|
| Moral (Decalogue) | Eternal, universal | Not boiled-down here, but background to all ethics | |
| Civil / Judicial | Governance of Israel's society | Property, justice, festivals | |
| Ceremonial | Worship rhythms, foreshadowing Christ | Harvest first-fruits, Sabbath year | |

3. Purpose of Mosaic law

- \circ "Schoolmaster to bring us unto Christ" (Gal 3:24) \rightarrow Laws shape character & spotlight Messiah.
- Laws also **separate from pagan practice** (e.g., boiling a kid in its mother's milk).

II. Illustrative Example — "Kid in Its Mother's Milk" (Ex 23:19)

| Observation | Significance |
|--------------------------|--|
| Canaanite fertility rite | Yahweh forbids Israel to mimic idolatrous rituals. |
| Principle today | Some divine "don'ts" guard minds/hearts from corrosive culture—even if the reason isn't obvious at first glance. |

III. The Angel of the LORD (Ex 23:20-23)

1. Text snapshot

"I send an Angel (mal'āk = messenger)... My name is in Him."

2. Messianic echo

Mal 3:1 "Messenger of the Covenant" → pre-incarnate Christ leading His people.

3. Conditions & promise

- Obey His voice → God becomes "enemy to your enemies."
- o Original plan: God Himself would fight; Israel would follow.

IV. Covenant Blessings (Ex 23:24-27)

| Blessing | Text | Clarification |
|--------------------|-----------|--|
| Exclusive worship | v. 24 | Israel to model monotheism to nations. |
| Provision & health | vv. 25-26 | Is NOT a curse on the sick/infertile today; a covenant-era pledge of national flourishing. |
| Fear on enemies | v. 27 | Psychological warfare—God breaks resistance ahead of Israel. |

V. Gradual Conquest Strategy (Ex 23:28-30)

1. "Hornets" (v. 28)

 Could be literal stinging insects or metaphor for panic-stricken armies—either way, divinely sent.

2. Little-by-little displacement (vv. 29-30)

- Prevents land from becoming desolate or overrun by wild beasts (cf. 2 Ki 17:23-26).
- Illustrates God's wisdom in timing—growth of Israel's population will match expanding territory.

VI. Biblical Precedents for Divine Warfare

- Red Sea Ex 14:13-14 "The LORD will fight for you."
- **Gideon vs. Midian** Jdg 7 (300 men, God wins).
- Jehoshaphat 2 Chr 20 (praise precedes victory).
- **Hezekiah** 2 Ki 19 (angel slays Assyrian army).
