## Wednesday's (Lesson 1): Be Strong

Scripture Focus: Joshua 1:7-9

### 1. Context and Challenges Facing Israel

- Israel was preparing to conquer the fortified city of Jericho, whose walls were legendary.
- Even the Egyptians, the dominant military power of the time, could not overcome its defenses.
- To breach such a city, a military would typically need:
  - Ladders for scaling
  - Siege tools to break through (e.g., rams or trebuchets—though the trebuchet was not invented until the 4th-5th century)
  - Protection against enemies holding the high ground
- Israel possessed none of these in adequate measure.
- Conclusion: Victory would clearly require supernatural intervention by God.

#### 2. God's Charge: Be Strong and Courageous

- The word "courage" (or a form of it) appears four times in Joshua 1:
  - Verse 6 Courage to receive the inheritance
  - Verse 7 Courage to obey the law
  - Verse 9 Courage to stand firm and not fear
  - Verse 18 (Fourth mention) Those who rebel against Joshua's command are to be punished, "only be strong and of a good courage."

- This repetition underscores the message:
  - Biblical courage is rooted in trust in God's power, not in personal strength or fearlessness.
  - God does not call for blind bravery, but for faith-fueled obedience.

#### 3. Courage to Obey God's Law

- The command to be courageous wasn't just for battle—it was especially about remaining obedient after victory.
- Joshua 1:7–9 stresses the importance of:
  - Observing the law
  - Meditating on it day and night
  - Letting it guide speech, thought, and action

### 4. Copying the Law: Internalizing the Covenant

- This principle of clinging to the law continues throughout Scripture.
- In Deuteronomy 17:14–18, God foresees Israel asking for a king.
  - Though not God's original plan, He gives instructions:
    - The king must write out a personal copy of the law by hand
    - This act of copying would reinforce the centrality of God's Word
- Though Joshua was not a king, he fulfills this pattern in Joshua 8, where he publicly copies the law for the people.
- According to Patriarchs and Prophets, the law was to be everywhere:
  - On doorposts, gates, ceilings

- A constant presence and reminder
- The goal: to build a people set apart from surrounding nations, faithful to their covenant identity
